



MFC Peony Monogram Standard Guidebook

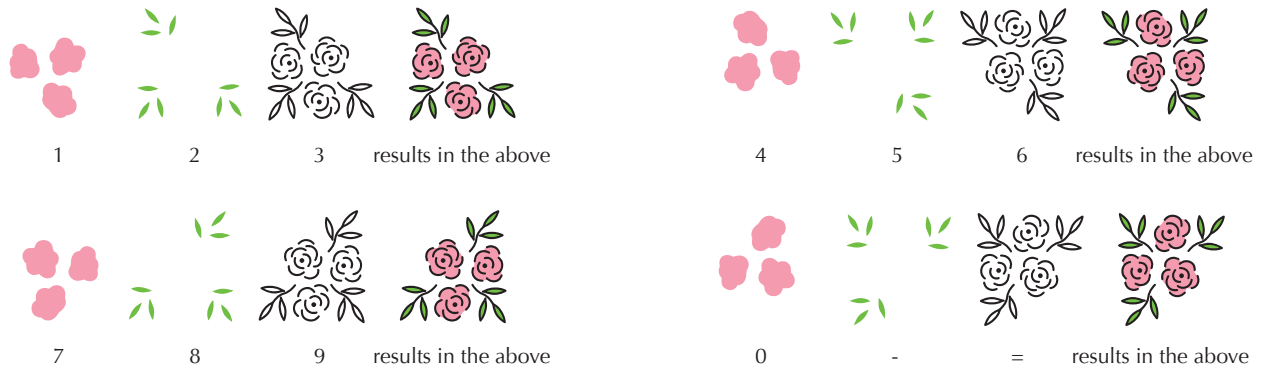
The inspiration source for Peony Monogram was an unique stackable monogram design with floral accents from a vintage embroidery publication. Originally intended to adorn handkerchiefs, this simple pattern has so many design possibilities, from colorizing to formatting options. You can really play around with this monogram font.

Peony Monogram Styles

Peony Monogram is capable of one, two, and three letter monograms due to its unique design. It can also be colorized, accented with floral corners, as well as be formatted into numerous configurations.

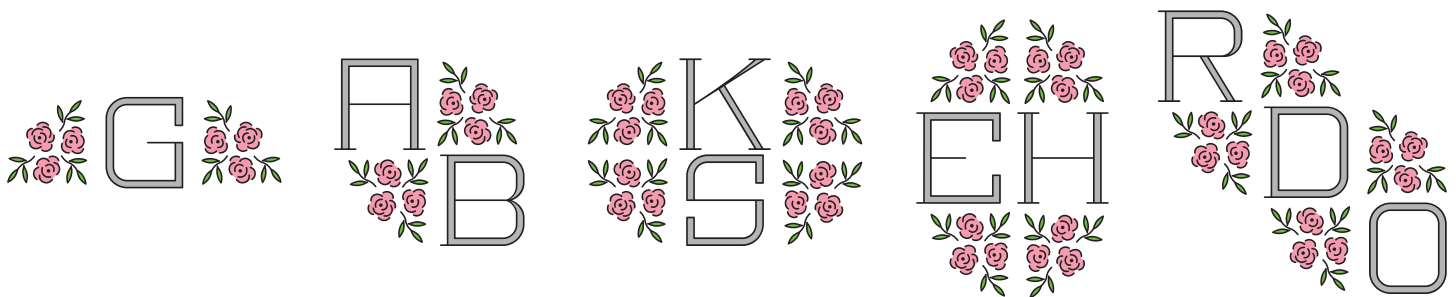
To create a striking solid monogram, select MFC Peony Monogram from your font menu. Because of Peony's unique stackable monogram formatting, make certain that the point size of the font is the same as the leading being applied to the font to minimize gapping between the stacked forms. While we've adjusted this within the font, your program may override these settings. For instance a 12 point font should have 12 points of leading.

Below is a map of the font, so you can easily reference how to type out the numerous possible combinations. When colorizing any outlines, typing order is important to make them automatically overlap. The space character is a standard letter width to help when formatting.



Type lowercase to type Capital fills, then type Capital letters to create the joined result as shown above typed "aAkKzZ" picking colors before each letter is typed.

Using the various elements above, you can type out stacked monograms using the return key. See some variation examples below...



The above are just some of the possible combinations that you can create using Peony Monogram. Try your hand at it, you may be surprised what you come up with!
